Salon with James Bartleman, former Lieutenant Governor of Ontario

The Redemption of Oscar Wolf has the outer appearance of containing a few autobiographical elements. The young Oscar is abandoned by his mother, lives for a time with a white family, gets an education and becomes the first aboriginal diplomat in Canada's foreign service with postings to Colombia, Australia and South Africa. Less autobiographically, Oscar, at age 13 in 1930, commits a terrible crime in the Muskoka town of Port Carling. The crime unintentionally results in the death of two people, including Oscar's grandfather, one of the few adults who ever showed love to the child.

A distinguished Harvard grad, past Dean of the Harvard School of Public Health and currently President of the US Institute of Medicine will be in Ottawa on September 18th-19th, 2013 as the 2013 Henry G. Friesen International Prizewinner. Dr. Harvey V. Fineberg is a renowned scholar and advocate in health policy development and in quality care.

This Prize is under the auspices of Friends of Canadian Institutes of Health Research and features a public forum event on Sept. 18th, wherein the Laureate addresses a number of academic societies, as well as a number of smaller groups on a topic of wide interest and intellectual heft.

The Harvard Club of Ottawa is invited to join the Institute at the Friesen International Prize Public Forum Lecture on September 18th, 2013 from 4 pm to 5:30 pm at the Fairmont Chateau Laurier Hotel, Ottawa, Adam Room.

The title of his talk is: "The Power of an Idea to Bring Ideas to Power"

Harvey V. Fineberg is President of the Institute of Medicine. He served as Provost of Harvard from 1997 to 2001, following thirteen years as Dean of the Harvard School of Public Health. He has devoted most of his academic career to the fields of health policy and medical decision-making. His past research has focused on the process of policy development and implementation, assessment of medical technology, evaluation and use of vaccines, and dissemination of medical innovations.

Dr. Fineberg helped found and served as president of the Society for Medical Decision Making and has been a consultant to the World Health Organization. At the Institute of Medicine, he has chaired and served on a number of panels dealing with health policy issues, ranging from HIV/AIDS to new medical technology. He also served as a member of the Public Health Council of Massachusetts (1976-1979), as chairman of the Health Care Technology Study Section of the National Center for Health Services Research (1982-1985), and as president of the Association of Schools of Public Health (1995-1996).

Dr. Fineberg is co-author of the books Clinical Decision Analysis, Innovators in Physician Education, and The Epidemic that Never Was, the latter an analysis of the controversial federal immunization program against swine flu in 1976. He has co-edited several books on such diverse topics as AIDS prevention, vaccine safety, and understanding risk in society. He has also authored numerous articles published in professional journals. Dr. Fineberg is the recipient of several honorary degrees and the Stephen Smith Medal for Distinguished Contributions in Public Health from the New York Academy of Medicine.

He earned his bachelor's and doctoral degrees from Harvard.

The Henry G. Friesen International Prize in Health Research was established in 2005 by FCIHR in recognition of Dr. Henry Friesen's distinguished leadership, vision and innovative contributions to health and health research. The \$35,000 Friesen Prize is awarded annually.

Harvard Club of Ottawa AGM --Canadian Health Care is not as good as you think!

AGM Nov 26, 2013 Featured Presentation By Dr. Jack Kitts, chief executive of the Ottawa Hospital and chair of the Health Council of Canada.

Dr. Robert Cushman, a Director General at Health since 2011, introduced Dr. Kitts. Dr. Cushman was Chief Executive Officer of the Champlain Local Health Integration network (LHIN) and prior to that he was the Medical Officer of Health for Ottawa. He noted that Dr. Kitts, as President and CEO of the Ottawa Hospital, had spearheaded the development of the hospital as regional health care centre doing both substantial outreach across Eastern Ontario and providing a high level of community services. The Hospital was the largest hospital in Canada with over 18,000 employees and a budget exceeding \$1 billion. He had done his advanced medical training in San Francisco, and was made a lucrative offer to stay, but he had decided to return to his roots, having grown up in Barry's Bay.

Dr. Kitts began by saying that HUCO had many leaders amongst its membership, and that the active support and engagement of such leadership was essential to the Hospital's success.

He then presented his remarks.

A lively question and answer period followed. He agreed that prevention was as important as cure in terms of the Hospital's broad strategy. It had been a prominent part of the 2003 Federal-Provincial Health Accord and must remain so going forward. The promotion of good health practices (diet, exercise) was important in tackling chronic health challenges like diabetes.

With respect to the recent Supreme Court decision on catastrophic drug costs he said that developing a national solution had proven very difficult. The 2003 Accord had called for a National Drug Strategy, cofunded by the federal and provincial governments with increased use of generic drugs to control costs. This had not happened for many reasons including that there was not enough evidenced-based data to inform such a strategy.

As for the biggest obstacle going forward, Dr. Kitts agreed with the questioner that a change in the medical culture was crucial. In fact, massive change was needed. In Ontario the government had mandated Quality Care Plans be prepared by all hospitals. Many were still lacking. Leadership and cultural change was needed from doctors, nurses, administrators and boards to sets goals, measure their achievement or not and to adjust accordingly. Although in the minority he did not think that more money was needed. What was in fact needed, were strategies to address the widely acknowledged inefficiencies in medical care delivery, in and out of hospitals, which approached 30 percent of overall costs. New legislation and policies were also likely needed.

On the question of whether funding a drug trial was easier in Canada or the United States, Dr. Kitts noted that in Canada Phase 1 was more often funded by government to avoid industry and company bias (about 60 percent). Industry generally funded further phases once the basic scientific parameters had been set (about 40 percent).

As for the challenge of delivering equitable care consistently in Canada with its vast geography, aging population and rising costs, Dr. Kitts said that the future was in regional health centres, like the Ottawa Hospital. They have the critical mass of trained personnel and technology to provide quality care at relatively less cost. This was to be preferred over dispersing services, especially given the aging population with chronic situations. Improving transportation services to people in smaller communities was needed to do this, combined with increased levels of assisted care outside of hospitals.

On the role of the private sector in changing the system, Dr. Kitts stated that this was already happening. Hospitals and doctors, publicly funded, represented 70 percent of the cost of the medical system. The other 30 percent of services were delivered by private providers, mostly publicly funded. The key ones were drugs, home care and rehabilitation. The status quo was clearly broken but Canadians clearly preferred a public system. The Royal Ottawa Triple P model (public private partnership) had evolved over time, so the merits of this approach were unclear.

On the tension between federal leadership and provincial jurisdiction, Dr. Kitts thought that leadership from the federal government was much needed. Extending funding until 2017, with an annual increase of 6 percent, with no strings attached, was not the way to go. While clearly the provinces wanted even more money, the federal government needed to be involved in accounting for how our tax dollars were spent.

As for the broader role of good governance in effecting health reform, Dr. Kitts, said the was no alignment between the federal government, the provinces, hospitals and health providers. The federal government needed to set conditions in terms of measurable objectives to be met by the provinces in order to receive transfer payments. Hospitals have not evolved sufficiently and there is no political will for sustained reform. Short term political expediency is regrettably the norm. Change can only come from new legislation, new policy, the breaking down of self interest silos.

On the position of the Ontario Conservative Party that it would end the LHINs if elected, Dr. Kitts stated that the LHIN was the right vision - local solutions to local health challenges through integration of health care services on a regional basis. The party leader's own region of Niagara was a case in point. The flaws were in the execution- quality care in the right setting, close to home was the goal. Local hospitals and their boards needed to adopt this approach, not resist it.

The event closed with John Baenziger presenting Dr. Kitts with a bottle of wine, and Lew Auerbach presenting a signed and framed letter from Governor General Johnston, class of 1963.

Why a joint Churchill Society-Harvard event? The connection between President Kennedy and Harvard is obvious, as Kennedy was both a Harvard graduate (Class of 1940) and a member of the Board of Overseers of Harvard before and during his entire presidency. As to Winston Churchill, it was President Kennedy who made Churchill the very first Honorary Citizen of the United States, just two months, almost to the day, before the two speeches about which Andrew Cohen has written. In his remarks, the President said (in part): "Sir Winston Churchill is the most honored and honorable man to walk the stage of human history in the time in which we live. ... The record of his triumphant passage will inspire free hearts for all time. By adding his name to our rolls, we mean to honor him – but his acceptance honors us far more."

Of the book, David Shribman, the Pulitzer Prize-winning Editor of the Pittsburgh Post-Gazette, has written: "He may have served for a thousand days but it was two days that made John F. Kennedy's presidency. No one before Andrew Cohen has recognized that, and because of his signal achievement in Two Days in June, no one will be able to write about - no one will be able to think about - John Kennedy ever again in quite the same way."

Ottawa Light Rail Transit from Above

A walking tour with Dennis Gratton, Manager of Rail Planning at the City of Ottawa

On June 4th, 2015, join the Harvard Club of Ottawa for a guided tour of the new Light Rail Transit (LRT) system, which is under construction in Ottawa. The tour will start at 6:00pm at the future Pimisi Station, located at the corner of Bronson and Albert. The tour will last roughly 1.5 hours and will end at Rideau Station, near the Rideau Center. We will then convene to a local pub in the Market for food, drinks, and friendly conversation. There is no charge for this event, but space is limited to 20 people – so Register Here.

The LRT is an essential piece of Ottawa's green agenda, and provides a fascinating window into our social commitments, our technology, our history and even our geology -- all topics our guide will fluently engage. Below is Mr. Gratton's description of the tour:

From the park above the escarpment at Bronson and Queen we will get a good look at the mining operation from the Confederation Line's west portal and will talk about plans to construct both the Pimisi Station and a new bridge at Booth to serve the LeBreton Flats. Issues related to connectivity, cycling and sustainability will be discussed.

Walking to Lyon Station we will talk about tunnel construction below grade and some of the engineering and design challenges leading to Lyon Station and integration with Place de Ville. We will also observe activity at the 'central shaft' of the tunnel.

At Parliament Station we will extend our discussion to integrated station design features at Sunlife and Heritage Place.

Continuing on Queen Street we will highlight the archaeological findings at the old cemetery and the process by which the remains have been dealt with from a scientific and legislative perspective, to find a final resting place at Beachwood Cemetery.

Finally we will follow the tunnel alignment under the canal to Rideau Street and see some of the above grade construction related to the project. We will talk about integration with the Rideau Centre and BNS building.

Note that along the way there will be time to field questions and discuss how the project is reshaping the city and advancing transit reliability, land development, and economic development throughout the region.

What's Going On?: Making Sense of U.S. Politics in a World Gone Mad

Book Club on "Bush Runner: The Adventures of Pierre-Esprit Radisson"

The Harvard Club of Ottawa Book Club is pleased to host the 2020 Taylor Prize winner for non-fiction: local writer, historian, political commentator, and lawyer, Mark Bourrie. Join us virtually on Sunday, April 18, 2021 at 7:00pm to discuss his book, Bush Runner: The Adventures of Pierre-Esprit Radisson.

The story is at once familiar, touching Canada's shores and storied institutions like the Hudson's Bay Company and the Radisson name: "They finally let up on this gruelling pace by resting at the confluence of the Gatineau, Rideau, and Ottawa Rivers, and camped near Lake Leamy on the north shore across from the cliffs where the home of Canada's prime minister now looms (p. 124)."

At the same time, it portrays a vastly different world hidden in our history: "That night, Radisson and some of the Odawa broiled and stewed the flesh of some of the slain Iroquois, then, after filling their bellies, built the cooking fire much higher and burned the bodies of the dead Odawa, giving them an honour reserved for the best warriors (p. 123)."

Mark portrays a remarkable and roguish Canadian in a story that is truly wilder than fiction. Hear him talk about his research, writing method, and how he brought his protagonist to life. He'll explore our historical relationship with and knowledge of Canada's Indigenous population and engage in dialogue with our members.
